

Convention on the Prohibition of the Development, Production, Stockpiling and Use of Chemical Weapons and on their Destruction (CWC)

What is it?

1997 treaty that prohibits developing, producing, acquiring, stockpiling, transferring and using chemical weapons (CW)

Administered by the Organization for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons (OPCW)

193 States Parties:

- Israel signed, not ratified
- Egypt, North Korea, and South Sudan neither signed nor ratified

Why is it important?

Requires States Parties to declare and destroy all CW, CW research and development facilities, CW production facilities, and old and abandoned CW in other states' territories

Defines CW as:

- Toxic chemicals and precursors—causing death, incapacitation, or permanent harm
- Munitions or devices—items designed to cause harm by releasing toxic chemicals
- Equipment—technology connected to the use of munitions or devices as CW

What should I know?

Verification regime permits:

- Routine Inspections to verify declarations
- Challenge Inspections to clarify and resolve questions of possible non-compliance
- Investigations of Alleged Use of Chemical Weapons

Since Entry-into-Force:

- 100% of world's declared stockpiles destroyed
- 72,304 metric tons of chemical agent stockpiles destroyed
- 128 States Parties implemented legislation supporting CWC mandate

CWC duration is **unlimited**
